Private Peaceful - Character Analysis




Here are some examples of work that were created by our students. Charlie was many students' favourite character in "Private Peaceful".

Project Podcast!

During our last term, our Transition Year students worked incredibly hard on creating their own podcast episode based on a topic of their choice, as part of a class competition. A podcast is a pre-recorded radio programme, usually a series, that can be played at any time at the listener's convenience. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, digital media such as podcasts have become incredibly popular.

For the podcast, the students chose a topic of their choice and brainstormed ideas for their podcast. Some of the topics included mental health, literature and general knowledge. Following this, they wrote out a script prior to recording. Then, they recorded their podcast segments which included an introduction, discussion clips and even pretend sponsorship segments. The students then edited their podcasts on editing software, which allowed them to add in audio, music and sound effects to create compelling podcast episodes. The process of creating, recording and editing their podcast episode utilised a number of skills such as writing skills, content creation, communication skills, team work and editing skills.

Our 1st place winners of our podcast competition were Ciara Brosnan and Aoife Kavanagh with their podcast episode "Spilling the Facts". Ciara and Aoife spoke about what their podcast comprised of:

"Our podcast was about showing our opinions on Netflix shows that we have watched and whether we would recommend them or not. We also did a Q+A



which included some fun questions so that our "audience" would be able to get to know us more. We also included a bloopers reel at the end of our podcast episode and a fake sponsorship segment for Barry and Lyons tea."

Our 2nd place winners of our podcast competition were Charlie O' Mara and Cassie McNamara-Crowe with their podcast episode "Electric Gaming Podcast". Their podcast was about "video games, consoles, fun facts and more". Charlie and Cassie went into detail about their recommendations for games, facts about consoles and also included a pretend sponsorship for EA Games. The goal of the Conference is to give citizens a greater say in shaping Europe's policies. In


Ireland, our aim is to have an inclusive conversation with Irish and other EU citizens living across the island of Ireland, to ensure that all our voices are heard during this process.

Green schools News

Over the past few, years we have been carrying out actions and increasing awareness of environmental issues in our school. As a group we watched the documentary 'Plastic Oceans' on Netflix. We were shocked to see how much throwaway plastic was in our sea. We were concerned about this. We looked at our school community and decided that we wanted to encourage students to use reusable bottles in our school.



We investigated how our single use plastic lifestyle is damaging our marine eco-systems. We created a film to highlight this issue. Our film has reached the finals of the Young Environmental Awards Finals which is being held on 26th May 2021. Guest speakers at the awards are our President Michael D. Higgins and former President Mary Robinson.

The film was shown on our Water day of Action held in April 2021. We gave out prizes to students and teachers for wearing the colour blue to highlight these issues.

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We held a walk for water. Some students in 5th year carried 9 litres of water in our school grounds to highlight that in the developing world, many do not have access to clean drinking water. They have to carry very heavy water jars to their villages twice a day. Our students created a podcast on this which was featured on RTEs Ecolution podcast.

Maha Shazadi, created a oneminute video on water. It was used as part of the #Water2me campaign and also included in world water day week.

Four students were selected to be Water Ambassadors in our school by An Taisce and they have attended a series of meetings with other students online during the past year.



Our science department became involved and created fun water experiments during our water action week. These included 'How do flowers open, Water pressure and how insects walk on water'. We then showed these experiments to our local primary school. We would like to thank the Science Department in particular Ms. Madigan for supporting us in Green Schools.

Two students in sixth year are leaving us in Green Schools this year and I want to thank and acknowledge their amazing work over the past 5 years in school, Haleema Nasir and Wajeeha Shahzadi. Both have previously won awards as Green Schools Student of the year in our school.
