

Maths week in Sexton Street began on Monday 17th October with our 2nd year students enjoying a fun hands-on "Anyone 4 Maths" workshop which was run by Christine Cambell organised by the University of Limerick. The workshop was built around quirky and interesting numbers and tables. The students were shown how one of the earliest calculators in the 16th century was created by Napier. An investigation also took place using bowling balls, from a mathematical perspective the question being – "do they float in

water....?" On Wednesday our Transition and 5th Year students took part in a very competitive Maths Table Quiz. The Teams were made up

of 4 students per team and we had 14 teams. The winners of our Table quiz were: Shanice McNally, Lynda Slattery, Ciara Judge and Vanessa Blake all from Transition Year – well done girls. Finally our First year students undertook a Maths project entitled: "How has Maths Changed", where our students were encouraged to complete their projects in pairs where they were asked to design a project to show how








Christmas Arrangements 2011
